New Show Bench rules

The competition commenced February 2023 has now concluded.

The competition will now be seasonal. Each year the competition will start at the August meeting and continue through to May of the following year.

Members can enter either the Exhibitor Section or the General Section but not both. Albert Knorr and Braidan Swan are the exception and are only permitted to enter the Exhibitor section.

All members can enter the remaining sections namely the Miniature Section, Vase of Roses, Most Perfumed Rose and the Show and Share section.

Each year the winner of the general section will advance to the Exhibitor section for the following year's competition.

Points will be awarded for the Exhibitor, General, Miniature and Vase of Roses sections.

First place will receive 3 points, second place will receive 2 points and third place will receive 1 point. There will be no points for entering.

An overall 'Best on the Bench' for the meeting will be awarded an extra point, and can be awarded to any entry from the first 4 sections.

No points will be awarded for the Most Perfumed Rose. The winner will be decided by popular vote and the member's name will be recorded. The most prolific winner of this section will be acknowledged at the awards meeting.

No points will be awarded for the 'Show & Share' Section and is for our enjoyment only.

The Show Bench winner for the season will be awarded to the person gaining the most points **irrespective** of whether they exhibited in the Exhibitor Section or in the General Section.

The winner will receive the perpetual trophy at the award's meeting held in August each year. The winner will keep the trophy until the following June where it will be handed back in for the next competition winner.

The runner up and third place getter will be acknowledged and presented with a small certificate and gift.

Place your rose on the display table with the rose name uppermost. No roses will be permitted on the display table without a label.

Have you just planted a new rose:

Adequate watering is essential at all stages of the rose's life. While some roses have a reputation of being drought tolerant, this is only true once established. When planting new roses it is important they are kept moist with regular watering. New roses that do not receive adequate water will be slow to break dormancy, suffer dieback or simply wilt and die.

When the soil is very dry it becomes hydrophobic. This means it will not absorb or retain moisture. Giving a dose of Eco Hydrate, or similar, will help. Potted roses are especially at risk of becoming hydrophobic so it's important to monitor and water regularly.

Wait until your rose has started to produce new leaves before fertilising, and adding a mulch will enrich the soil, as well as keeping the soil at an even temperature and helping it to retain moisture. Keep mulch to a maximum of 5cm deep, and don't forget to mulch your potted roses.

Pests to watch out for:

<u>Aphids</u> appear in early spring, and they can be found on young flower buds and new foliage. They can form large colonies which will then naturally decline going into summer, before coming back again in the autumn.

Aphids suck the juice from the plant and produce honeydew which then attracts ants.

You can hose the aphids off with water or squish them with your fingers if the infestation is small. Or you can attract ladybirds into your garden, by growing herbs like coriander, fennel & dill, as the ladybirds and their larvae, love to eat aphids. However you will need to avoid using any insecticides as even the most environmentally friendly insecticide will harm the ladybirds.

However if you choose to use an insecticide the most environmentally friendly insecticide is natural pyrethrum.

<u>Curl grubs</u> are the larvae of different species of beetles including the Black African Beetle, Christmas beetles and Scarab beetles.

The life cycle of curl grubs vary in length from one year to every two or three years depending on the species, therefore you can find curl grubs in the garden at any time of the year.

Female beetles lay eggs in the soil which hatch and feed on plant roots. Curl grubs can cause serious damage to turf grasses, damage a range of garden and edible plants and also infest the roots of potted plants. Root damage causes turf to die off leaving brown patches and the patches can be rolled back like carpet because the larvae have nibbled off all the roots. Check potted plants where the plant looks dried out. Infestation levels are usually worse after prolonged periods of very dry hot weather.

Help prevent by not mowing your lawn too closely. Keep your lawn healthy by appropriately watering & feeding your lawns. Throw any grubs to the birds to feed on, as this breaks the life cycle by preventing the next generation of egg laying beetles from emerging. Always check for grubs when re-potting plants

For an organic control, apply eco-neem to lawns, garden beds & potted plants as a soil drench using a watering can, optimally between mid spring to mid summer.

It is also believed that applying the grey water from washing machines containing a low sodium detergent can assist with keeping curl grubs under control.

The adult beetles are attracted to light, so garden lights and sensor lights could be attracting them into your garden

Coming across one or two curl grubs in a garden bed is usually no cause for alarm. It is only when you discover larger numbers that significant damage occurs and treatment is required. With potted plants however they should always be controlled regardless of the number you find.
